10 ENVIRONMENTS

The order of the 10 Environments listed coincides with the monthly distribution of this resource.

1

"God has a big story, and I can be a part of it!"

Storytelling

The power of The Big God Story impacts our lives by giving us an accurate and awe-inspiring perspective into how God has been moving throughout history. It is the story of redemption, salvation, and hope and tells how I have been grafted into it by grace. It further compels us to see how God is using every person's life and is creating a unique story that deserves to be told for God's glory.

2

"I belong to God, and He loves me!"

IDENTITY

This environment highlights who we are in Christ. According to Ephesians 1, we have been chosen, adopted, redeemed, sealed, and given an inheritance in Christ ... all of which we did nothing to earn. This conviction allows children to stand firm against the destructive counter-identities the world will offer.

3

"God's family cares for each other and worships God together."

Faith Community

God designed us to live in community and to experience Him in ways that can only happen in proximity to one another. The faith community serves to create an environment to equip and disciple parents, to celebrate God's faithfulness, and to bring a richness of worship through tradition and rituals, which offer children an identity. Our love for each other reflects the love we have received from God.

4

"Asks the question, 'What needs to be done?"

SERVING

This posture of the heart asks the question, "What needs to be done?" It allows the Holy Spirit to cultivate a sensitivity to others and focuses on a cause bigger than one individual life. It helps fulfill the mandate that as Christ-followers we are to view our lives as living sacrifices that we generously give away!

5

"God transforms me when I step out in faith."

Out of the Comfort Zone

As children and students are challenged to step out of their comfort zone from an early age, they learn to experience a dependence on the Holy Spirit to equip and strengthen them beyond their natural abilities and desires. We believe this environment will cultivate a generation that, instead of seeking comfort, seeks a radical life of faith in Christ.

6

"God has entrusted me with the things and people He created around me."

Responsibility

This environment captures the ability to take ownership for one's life, gifts, and resources before God. A child must be challenged to take responsibility for his or her brothers and sisters in Christ, as well as for those who are spiritually lost. Our hope is that the Holy Spirit will use this environment to allow each child to understand that God has entrusted His world to us.

7

"When I get off track, God offers me a path of healing."

Course Correction

This environment flows out of Hebrews 12:11–13 and is the direct opposite of punishment. Instead, biblical discipline for a child encompasses a season of pain, the building up in love, and a vision of a corrected path for the individual with the purpose of healing at its core.

8

"God fills me with His love so I can give it away."

Love & Respect

Without love, our faith becomes futile. This environment recognizes that children need an environment of love and respect in order to be free to both receive and give God's grace. Innate to this environment is the value that children are respected because they embody the image of God. We must speak to them, not at them, and we must commit to an environment where love and acceptance are never withheld due to one's behavior.

9

"God knows me, and I can know Him."

Knowing

Nothing could be more important than knowing and being known by God. We live in a world that denies absolute truth, and yet God's Word offers just that. As we create an environment that upholds and displays God's truth, we give children a foundation based on knowing God, knowing His Word, and a relationship with Him through Christ. God is holy, mighty, and awesome, and yet He has chosen to make Himself known to us!

10

"I see Christ in others, and they can see Him in me."

Modeling

Biblical content needs a practical living expression in order for it to be spiritually impacting. This environment serves as a hands-on example of what it means for children to put their faith into action. Modeling puts flesh on faith and reminds us that others are watching to see if we live what we believe.

A BLESSING CAN BE A PRAYER OF COMMISSION, A BIBLE PASSAGE, OR WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT. BLESSINGS CAN BE SPOKEN OVER A CHILD FOR THE PURPOSE OF DECLARING GOD'S PROTECTION, JOY, AND WISDOM OVER HIM.

Week One

GOODNESS OF GOD (READ JAMES 1:17)

(Child's name), may you remember that God gives you good gifts. His heart toward you is kindness, goodness, love, and grace. May you see the countless ways He has been good to you in your life. His love for you is everlasting and unconditional.

Week Two

MOTHER'S DAY (READ PSALM 139:13-14)

(Child's name), may you find joy this week knowing God created you exactly how He wanted you to be. He grew you inside of your mother and cares so deeply about you. May you remember that you are fearfully and wonderfully made by your heavenly Father.

Week Three

FAITH (READ HEBREWS 11:1)

(Child's name), may your faith be strong this week. May you remember that faith is having confidence in things we can't see. So, even if you can't see how things will get better, may you remember that God is in control, can be trusted with your future, and will be glorified by your faith in Him.

Week Four

COURAGE (READ ISAIAH 41:10)

(Child's name), may you grow in courage as you trust in the Lord. He will always be with you, and He promises to give you strength when you feel sad, weak, or broken. He is powerful and kind, able to do more than you can imagine.

GOD'S WORD



GOD STATEMENT:

God Is All-Knowing

SCRIPTURE:

Psalm 139:1-6. 13-16

We are relational beings. From the moment we are born to the moment we leave this world, our lives are full of different kinds of relationships—from our parents, siblings, and extended family to friends, co-workers, and the barista at our favorite coffee shop. Relationships with friends and family can be wonderful and life-giving. However, they cannot bring us ultimate fulfillment. Friends will disappoint us. Family will misunderstand us. There is only one who will not: God.

Through the words of Kind David, we see that God knows each one of us intimately. He knows our thoughts, our actions, and our words. He knows us like this because He formed us in our mother's womb. Nothing about us is hidden from Him. He knows us and understands us like no one else can. We are known by the One True God and He wants us to know Him. That is good news.

Our friends and family can never know us the way that God can. Only He can fulfill the desire to be completely known and understood. This should compel us to know Him more. We do this by opening the Bible and discovering more of who He is and how we can follow Him. We read the words back to Him as prayers and declarations of His goodness.

DISCUSSION

How does it feel to know that the God who created the entire world knows you and wants you to know Him? Take time to rest in this fact and thank Him for doing what only He can do.

GOD STATEMENT:

God Is Present

SCRIPTURE:

Deuteronomy 7:9; Isaiah 43:10; Ephesians 1:17

Relationships take work, even our relationship with God. We learned last week that God knows us intimately and that He desires us to know Him too. One way we do this, as we discussed, is by reading His Word.

The Lord instructs His people, the Israelites, in Deuteronomy 7:9 saying, "Know therefore that the LORD your God, is God ..." The Hebrew word for "know" is yāda. In Hebrew word means to know, learn to know, perceive, or to know by experience. Not only can we get to know God by reading His Word, but also by learning from those wiser than us, reading books and by experience.

How do we learn by experience? We start by asking Him to show us how He is with us every day. He is not a God who is far away, but a God who is near and who wants to be a part of our everyday lives. When we ask Him to reveal Himself in this way, He is faithful to do so. We must open our eyes to what He is doing. We will begin to experience who He is in new ways. We will see His faithfulness in big and small ways. His provision will become noticeable where we did not see it before. He will become more real to us as we experience who He is each day.

DISCUSSION

Pray together as a family. As you pray, ask the Lord to open your eyes to who He is each day. Pray individually for each person by name. "Lord, would you reveal yourself to (insert name of child) in each day..." Ask Him to show each of you the ways He is working in your lives. Perhaps there are things you may have missed before or attributed to luck or something else. Thank Him for being present with you each day and ask Him for more understanding of who He is.

This week, send each person into their day with the reminder to look for God in new ways. Each night at dinner, discuss how they saw God at work. Then ask if there was something new that they learned about God.



GOD STATEMENT:

God Is the One and Only God

SCRIPTURE:

Deuteronomy 6:4-9

On the 40-year journey to the Promised Land from Egypt, Moses experienced the harsh reality of leading people whose hearts were prone to follow the false gods of other nations. The worship of these false gods instead of the One and Only God always had calamitous and deadly consequences.

In this passage from Deuteronomy, Moses instructed the next generation of Israelites before entering the Promised Land, to love the Lord their God with all their heart, soul, and strength. This generation would only find true life and flourishing by loving, listening, and responding to the One True God. This generation had the potential to be a compelling living story to the other nations of what it meant to follow the One and Only God.

Deuteronomy 6:4–5 is known as the Shema. Passed down through the generations, the Shema became a very important daily prayer for the Israelites. Jesus also prayed the Shema. Jesus quoted the Shema when asked by the Pharisees which commandment was the greatest. (Mark 12:29-31)

The Bible tells us that we can know who God is—God is the One and Only God. We can choose to listen and respond to God by loving Him with all that we are. Following His ways leads to life for us and those around us.

DISCUSSION

Read Deuteronomy 6:4-9 together as a family. Ask, how important is it do God that we know Him? What does this passage tell us to do? Discuss together. How will putting these things into practice help us know who God is? What action words in these verses stand out to you? How does listening and responding show love? In what ways does this prayer empower you to put God on display?

GOD'S WORD



GOD STATEMENT:

The Holy Spirit Is Wisdom

SCRIPTURE:


Ephesians 1:17-18

Paul was in Ephesus as a missionary. After being imprisoned by the Romans he wrote the letter of Ephesians. Paul prays in Ephesians 1:17, "I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better." Paul wanted followers of Jesus to experience the power of the Holy Spirit. Since our own broken human thinking can cloud the truth about God, we need the Holy Spirit of wisdom and revelation to help us know God better. Human wisdom is bent on elevating me, myself, and I as the center of all things. The Spirit of wisdom and revelation elevates God as the center of truth—He is the center of all things. When we know who God is, by the Spirit we give the rightful place to our Creator.

Paul continues, "I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people." Paul knows that we need a supernatural awakening to truly know the gift that God has given us—the hope through Jesus that we have been made His sons and daughters. We can be certain as believers that we are heirs of God's Kingdom through Jesus.

DISCUSSION

As a family discuss the following questions: How does Ephesians 1:17-18 frame your thinking about who God is? How do you think praying for yourself and others helps you know God better? Take time to pray this week's passage over you and those around you.



FAMILY TIME RECIPES



Philly Cheesesteak Quesadillas

Hey kids! Mother's Day is this month. Treat your mom to a great lunch! SHHH. Don't tell her. These cheesesteak quesadillas are sure to be a favorite for the entire family.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 1 pound beef sirloin steak, cut into thin strips
- 1 green bell pepper
- 1 red bell pepper
- 1 medium onion
- 6 ounces mushrooms
- 8 slices provolone

- 1 tablespoon olive oil, divided
- 1 garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ½8 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 teaspoons mayo
- 8 flour tortillas

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- 1. Set up a vegetable chopping station at the kitchen table. Place child safe plastic knives at the chopping station. Invite the kids to join you at the table. Have them chop the vegetables with your supervision. The size and shape of the chopped veggies does not need to be perfect.
- 2. Heat 2 teaspoons olive oil in a skillet on medium heat and add the sliced meat. Season with salt and pepper. Once fully cooked, remove from skillet.
- 3. Add vegetables to skillet and cook until tender.
- 4. Mix beef in skillet with vegetables and add garlic.
- 5. Cook together until meat is reheated.
- 6. Have kids spread mayonnaise on the tortillas.
- 7. Divide meat and vegetable mix to half the tortilla, top with provolone cheese and close the tortilla.
- 8. Place tortilla in heated pan and sauté until cheese is melted and the outside is golden brown, flipping once.
- 9. Slice into quarters and serve.

Family Friendly Piña Colada

Let this drink transport you to the beautiful Puerto Rican beaches. It will only take five minutes to prepare a tropical piña colada that the entire family will enjoy!



WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 2 cups coconut cream
- 1 cup condensed milk or condensed coconut milk
- 2 cups pineapple juice
- 2 cups frozen pineapple chunks,
- Reserve a few chunks to decorate
- 4 cups ice
- drink umbrellas
- Maraschino cherries (optional)

WHAT YOU'LL DO 《《

- 1. Place frozen pineapple chunks, pineapple juice, coconut cream, ice, and condensed milk in a blender.
- 2. Blend until smooth
- Pour into glasses and garnish with fresh pineapple wedges, an umbrella, and optional Maraschino cherries.
- 4. Servings: approximately 4.

BLT Pasta Salad

This BLT pasta salad is delicious and easy to make. It's one of those side dishes you can bring to any barbecue or potluck.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- · 1 pound pasta
- 4 pieces bacon, fried and cut into small pieces
- 2 large ripe tomatoes, diced
- 1/2 head of iceberg lettuce, chopped

- 1/2 red onion, diced
- 1/2 cup ranch dressing
- ½ cup Italian dressing
- salt and pepper to taste

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- Make your pasta according to the package instructions, drain and rinse in cold water.
- 2. Cook the bacon while the pasta is boiling.
- 3. Cut up the lettuce, tomato, onion, and the cooked bacon.
- 4. Mix the Italian and ranch dressings together.
- 5. In a large bowl, mix the pasta and bacon.
- 6. Pour the dressings over the pasta and mix well.
- 7. Add the veggies just before serving to keep them from wilting.
- 8. Add the salt and pepper as needed.
- 9. Serve or chill right away.

Shortcut Fruit Pizza

Tired of the same after school snacks every week? Try something new with this simple shortcut fruit pizza. This is a great recipe to make with the kids. They can make the entire pizza with some supervision.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 1 sleeve graham crackers
- 1/2 cup cream cheese
- 3 tablespoons honey
- fruit of your choice

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- . Mix honey and cream cheese together until smooth.
- 2. Spread mixture on graham crackers.
- 3. Cut fruit into bite-size pieces and place on top graham crackers.

KNOWS YOU

PSALM 139:1-6

"You have searched me, LORD, and you know me. You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar. You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways. Before a word is on my tongue you, LORD, know it completely. You hem me in behind and before, and you lay your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain."

PSALM 139:13-18

"For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be. How precious to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them! Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand—when I awake, I am still with you."

It is amazing that the God of all creation knows us so intimately—every detail of who we are is not hidden from Him. Scripture tells us that He knows the number of hairs on our heads (Luke 12:7). Can you count the hairs on your head? God knows more about us than just our hair. He knows what makes us happy, sad, and frustrated. He knows when we are joyful and when we are lonely. Our God cares about us. He is not far off observing us from a remote location, He is close. We are known by God and we can know Him.

PRAYER

Father God, thank you for knowing us. Thank you for creating us and knowing us completely. May we know your great love for us. May we remember that you know us and are always close. We give you each day and every part of our lives.



WHAT YOU'LL NEED

· clay or playdough

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- 1. Read the above verses in Psalm 139 together.

 Discuss as a family what it means to be known
 by each other. How do you feel when someone
 knows what you like, or how you feel? How do you
 feel when someone doesn't seem to care how you
 feel? Allow each person to communicate how they
 feel knowing that God, our Creator, knows us so
 intimately.
- Give each person in the family clay or playdough.
 Ask them to think about one thing they know really
 well. Use the playdough to make that item.
- Then allow each person to share why they chose the item, and why it is important to them. Discuss as a family how God knows everything about each one of us. He knows the things we like and think are funny. And He knows the things deep inside us—our thoughts and feelings. Allow family members to respond.
- Take some time to thank God for knowing each of us and inviting each of us to know Him.

GAME TIME

PASS IT ON

"Pass It On" is a mix between Pictionary and Telephone. In both Pictionary and Telephone, only the originator knows the truth. As the game progresses it gets further from the originator and the truth begins to change based on what the next person sees or hears. As Christ followers it is important for us to stay close to God's Word. When we know His Word, we can know the truth of who God is.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- · notepads for each person
- pen or pencil for each person
- 25 index cards

WHAT YOU'LL PREPARE

Use the index cards to create a stack of 25 game cards. Each card must have an object, action, or saying written on it. Have fun and be sure to have a good mix of all the cards.

Ideas to get you started: broken arm, unibrow, basketball, nightlight, dirty diaper, "when pigs fly", Captain Underpants, flying, playing soccer, "easy peasy, lemon squeezy"

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- 1. Give each person a notepad and pencil.
- 2. Have each person choose a game card.
- 3. On the first page of your notepad, write a word that describes what you saw on the card you drew.
- 4. Pass your notepad to the next player.
- 5. Have the player look at the word, turn the page, and draw the word.
- 6. Pass the drawing onto the next player.
- 7. Have player turn the page and write the word he or she thinks is drawn.
- 8. Continue until you have your original notepad back.
- 9. Have each player takes turns telling the story in his or her notepad.

POST-GAME QUESTIONS

What happened each time the notepad was passed around? Did you get your notepad back with all the pages being the same as the first page? It changed a bit, didn't it? Why? Discuss. What is the best way for us to get to know the truth about someone? Talk as a family. Discuss the great gifts we have been given in having the Bible and prayer as ways to get to know God and spend time with Him.





All around us creation sings and plays with its Creator. We hear the songs of the birds each morning, the worship of the trees in the wind, and the dance between the sun and moon in the sky. When we know God, we learn how to hear and see Him all around us. When we lose our connection to our Creator, His voice becomes quieted by all the chaos around us. Work, family, hobbies, distractions, and financial and relational stressors all scream for our attention, yet the voice of God whispers softly, "abide in me...".

This month, as a way to get to know your Creator, take some time with your family to play in His creation as His creation. Maybe you've heard of a family "Yes Day" where anything goes. Instead of a "Yes Day," plan a family "God Day" where every activity and meal is an opportunity to look for and hear from God. Before leaving the house, read Psalm 139 together as a family. Talk about the unique ways He made each of you, and celebrate a few characteristics you love about one another. As you leave for your "God Day," have a list of ways you'd like to see Him through animals, a conversation with a stranger, volunteering at a shelter, or hiking through the mountains or picking up rocks along a creek bed.

When you get home, sit around the dinner the table and discuss these questions:

- 1. Where did I hear God's voice?
- 2. What makes me want to obey God's voice?
- 3. Why is it sometimes difficult to obey?

Then celebrate a day of getting to know our God who knows us and make every day a "God Day."

WORDS OF LIFE

Think of a time when someone has spoken something over you and it encouraged you, or it answered a prayer you had prayed. God uses people for this plan and purpose in our lives. Just as God uses people to speak into our lives, God can use us to speak truth into the lives of others. We know from the book of James that words have power, the power of life and death (James 3:9-12). May we seek to know God more and more each day. In knowing Him, may we speak words of life, truth, hope and peace to those we meet.

SCRIPTURE:

EPHESIANS 1:7-10

In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace, which he lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight making known to us the mystery of his will, according to his purpose, which he set forth in Christ as a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. (Ephesians 1:7-10)

Can you think of a time when you felt like you were an utter failure? When you messed up so badly, you didn't want anyone to know about it? I know I have. Yet, I know that God Himself sees me, knows my failures, and knows my sins. Still, He chose to redeem me by Jesus' blood.

These verses mean that God, through Jesus, set forth His plan to unite us with Him. As He forgives all of our sins through Jesus, no matter how terrible, He calls us His own.

GOD STATEMENT:

SCRIPTURE:

EPHESIANS 1:11-14

We were also chosen to belong to him. God decided to choose us long ago in keeping with his plan. He works out everything to fit his plan and purpose. We were the first to put our hope in Christ. We were chosen to bring praise to his glory. You also became believers in Christ. That happened when you heard the message of truth. It was the good news about how you could be saved. When you believed, he stamped you with an official mark. That official mark is the Holy Spirit that he promised. The Spirit marks us as God's own. We can now be sure that someday we will receive all that God has promised. That will happen after God sets all his people completely free. All these things will bring praise to his glory. (Ephesians 1:11-14 NIrV)

Dr. Michelle Anthony shares in *Spiritual Parenting*: "If we truly began to believe any of it, we would stand a little taller, with our heads a little higher—if we really believed it! Think about the provisions that God has made for us, said about us now and in our future, and valued to do in us because of His great love. I think it would impact the way we lived if we thought those things were true."

Read the verses a second time. As you read them again, have family members pay attention to the things that stick out to them. Is it a word or phrase? Let the words soak in. Let them take residency in your hearts.

DISCUSSION

Share your observations and the things that stood out the most to each of you. What does this passage say about you? What does it say about God? When we choose to trust and follow Him, what does He give to us? What has God promised us? Close this time together by praying as a family.

Dear Parents, may you know that God has chosen you to be the first people to usher this truth into your child's heart. He has entrusted you with the unique privilege of helping your children discover their identity. May you rest in knowing you have everything you need through the power of the Holy Spirit of God.



FAMILY TIME RECIPES

June is the time of year when we celebrate Father's Day and the start of summer. Consider having a family night with your extended family and friends. Once all the food is prepped, place all of the delicious recipes on the grill while you enjoy some cold lemonade and discuss the "God's Word" questions, play the June Game, or participate in the Create activity.



Bruschetta

My oldest is at an age where she loves to cook when people come over. Her favorite appetizer is Bruschetta. With minimal prep any age can help make this delicious appetizer.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 1 French baguette
- olive oil
- 3-4 Roma tomatoes
- 7 fresh basil leaves
- · 2 cloves garlic

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- 1. Heat oven to 350° F.
- 2. Cut French baguette into 1/4 inch slices.
- 3. Put bread slices in a baking dish and place in the oven until golden brown, about 5 minutes.
- 4. While the bread is toasting, cut the tomatoes into cubes.
- 5. Crush one garlic clove.
- 6. Cut basil into small slices.
- Combine tomatoes, crushed garlic, and basil into a bowl.
- 8. When the bread is done toasting, cut one clove of garlic in half and rub on each piece of bread.
- 9. Lightly brush each piece of bread with olive oil.
- Scoop a spoonful of tomato mixture onto each piece of toasted bread.

Homemade Lemonade

Nothing is better than homemade lemonade in the summer. This is an easy recipe with just 3 ingredients that are generally always on hand. Invite the kids to help make the lemonade



WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 6 medium-size lemons
- 1/2 cup sugar
- · 3 cups water
- sliced strawberries, lemons, or whole blueberries to garnish (optional)

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- Cut lemons in half and juice them using a handheld juicer.
- 2. In a pitcher, add freshly squeezed lemon juice and sugar together.
- 3. Add water to taste until you reach your desired sweetness.

Grilled Chicken Kabobs

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 1 pound boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- salt and pepper to taste

- 1 red bell pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 yellow bell pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 small zucchini, cut into 1-inch slices
- 1 red onion, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- 1. Place the olive oil, soy sauce, honey, garlic and salt and pepper in a large bowl. Whisk to combine.
- 2. Add the chicken, bell peppers, zucchini and red onion to the bowl. Toss to coat in the marinade.
- Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour, or up to 8 hours.
- 4. Soak wooden skewers in cold water for at least 30 minutes. Preheat grill or grill pan to medium high heat.
- Thread the chicken and vegetables onto the skewers.
- 6. Cook for 5-7 minutes on each side or until chicken is cooked through.
- 7. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.



Don't have a grill at home? You can bake your chicken kabobs instead! They're equally delicious.

- 1. After marinating the chicken and veggies for at least 1 hour, preheat oven to 450° F.
- 2. Thread the chicken and vegetables onto the
- 3. Place on two baking sheets lined with aluminum foil.
- 4. Bake in the oven for 25–30 minutes, flipping the skewers about halfway through. Check to make sure the chicken is cooked all the way through. You may need to cook for an additional 5–10 minutes depending on the size of your chicken chunks.

Vegetarian, gluten-free, and keto these party appetizers are creamy and delicious. The fresh chives help them stand out.


WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 12 miniature sweet peppers
- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1/3 cup fresh chives, minced
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 2/3 cup fresh broccoli, finely chopped
- 2/3 cup shredded cheddar cheese

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- Preheat the oven to 400° F.
- 2. Cut peppers in half lengthwise; remove seeds.
- In a bowl, mix cream cheese, chives, salt and pepper; stir in broccoli.
- 4. Spoon into pepper halves. Place on a foil-lined baking sheet; bake until heated through, 9-11 minutes.
- 5. Sprinkle with cheddar cheese. Bake until cheese is melted, 3-4 minutes longer.
- 6. Cool slightly before serving.



THE CHARACTER TREE

(OR FAMILY TREE)

Have you ever created a family tree? It's an organized way to see all the people in any given family. A family tree shows each generation and the relationships associated with each person. Over time, you can see the different tree branches and each family member attached to them. This diagram can be a blueprint of our lives, the foundation in which our lineage comes from. Sometimes, these are called "genealogies." We often see these in Scripture! Today, you have the chance to build your family tree!

These tree diagrams are more than just names. Each person in your family has (or had) a specific personality and identity. So, what if you took your family tree to the next level? Instead of simply writing out all your family members and mapping who is related to whom, include personality traits or qualities you know to be true about these people. As a family, think about each member of your family and the good traits that each of them portrays (or portrayed). As you build the tree, write these qualities under the names. Remember, our identity comes from Christ. So, when you are thinking about the qualities you see in others, think of how you see Jesus in them.

As you think through your family, include God at the roots of your tree. He is the Author and Creator of our lives; He is the one who gives us life. He is always at the center of our lives and our families. Now, gather your family, and create a family tree together!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- large blank paper
- markers
- · finger paint (optional)
- pictures of family members (optional)
- qualities related to each individual person
 You can add whatever you want to your family tree, these are just some ideas to get you started.

WHAT YOU'LL DO

- · Write a list of all your family members.
- Draw a tree on the paper (you can outline your hand/arm as a template).
- Starting at the trunk, place the oldest person at the bottom and then as you continue growing the family outward, place the next generation on the branches and so on.
- Write out the qualities you see in these people under their names.
- Decorate the family tree however you choose. Have fun!

Do your kids know that you think of them as delightfully energetic and fun? In this game, you and the entire family will have the opportunity to bless each other while trying to remember not just what you think of each other but what everyone else in the family thinks also!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

HOW TO PLAY

Gather the family around in a circle. Pick a person you want to describe first, like Mom or Dad. The person who answers first will try to think of something positive about the person that starts with the letter A and begins the sentence.

Example: Dad, you are Awesome!

Then, the next person in the circle will repeat the sentence but add something that starts with the letter B.

one remembers the whole sentence. When that round is complete, move on to blessing the next person. To make it more challenging, encourage strings of multiple letters!

Example: Dad, you are Awesome, Brave, Courteous, and Delightfully Encouraging!

For highly competitive families, you can eliminate players in that round as they forget parts of the sentence or hesitate for longer than a few seconds. You can also challenge yourselves even more by randomizing the letters. If you have Scrabble letters, place them face down, mix them around, and let each person pick their following letter as they go. Another way to make your own "deck" of letters with pieces of paper is to mark a letter on one side and leave the other side blank. The family can even decorate or use different colors before you place them all down face down like a deck of playing cards.

Guaranteed that by the end, you will have laughed lots and been blessed.

Once each family member has been blessed, do a round together and have the recipient of your words be

Example: God, you are Amazing, Beautiful, and Compassionate.

As you close the game, pray together as a family praying words of thanksgiving for each person beginning with the Lord, then each person in the family.

YOU ARE YOUR FATHER'S CHILD

Our earthly fathers have a powerful impact on how we view our heavenly Father. How they act, what they say, and how they treat us, often shape our perceptions of God. Knowing their true identity will give them the solid foundation they need to stand when the storms of life come. They can stand firm, knowing they are unconditionally loved and that they too belong to a perfect, unwavering Father. And while we wait to receive a beautiful reward in heaven as our eternal inheritance, we can also enjoy our inheritance now by acknowledging the new identity He's established in us.



Dear Family, may you know the deep love of the Father. Each day He is forming you into the likeness of His Son. May you take be a blessing to others as you have been blessed.




- What do you think God looks like?




KEEPING UP WITH YOUR KIDS

We live in a world that is subconsciously speaking false identity statements over our children—and our kids are believing them. In order to help our children know how to stand firm against the destructive counter identities the world will offer, we must speak God's identity over them frequently and lovingly. Use the following statements from Scripture to speak over your child daily and encourage your child to speak the statements loudly and with conviction.

- You are/I am valuable. "You are priceless to me. I love you and honor you" (Isaiah 43:4a NIrV).
- You are/I am loved. "I have loved you with an everlasting love; I have drawn you with unfailing kindness" (Jeremiah 31:3).
- You are/I am chosen. "For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love he predestined us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ" (Ephesians 1:4–5).
- You are/I am a child of the King. "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession" (1 Peter 2:9).

Making God Central

I am continually awestruck that God, who is holy, mighty, and awesome, has chosen to reveal Himself to us. The environments of IDENTITY and KNOWING blend perfectly as we discover who God is and who we are created to be. Genesis 1:27 is clear that "God created mankind in his own image." When we know the character of God, we can know our true identity.

Reading the Bible together, blessing your children, or praying is a fantastic way to know more about who God is. When God is the center of each story, His character and nature are on display. We often read a story in the Bible, take Noah for example, and focus on Noah's obedience to God. While showing obedience to God is an essential part of following Christ, it doesn't reveal who God is. Instead, we can focus on the character of God revealed in that passage of Scripture. Asking the question, "What do we know about God from this part of the Bible?" encourages us to go beyond the people in the narrative and focus on God as the center of the narrative. Answers may be "God is kind, caring, or merciful." From here, you can create a statement about God from the passage you just read, for example, "God is merciful." This puts the character of God on display and shows us that He is central in the story.

As a family, take some time to practice placing God in the center of the story through God Statements.

Doing so increases our understanding of who God is and shows us our identity as children of God.

What attributes of God's character are revealed in the three verses below?

"So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female, he created them" (Genesis 1:27).

"For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well" (Psalm 139:13-14).

"For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Ephesians 2:10).

These verses show us that God is the Creator of everything. He knows the intimate details of our lives and cares about us. God calls us wonderful and acceptable in His sight. These verses reveal that God is worthy of our praise and admiration. He has created us "to do good works."

God Statements increase our understanding of God while also revealing who we are. First, Genesis says we are created in "His own image." Next, Psalm 139:14 poetically states that we are "fearfully and wonderfully made." Finally, Ephesians 2:10 reveals that we are created to do the "good works, which God prepared beforehand." This practice of reading Scripture with God's character in the forefront builds our understanding of our identity in Christ.

As a family, take some time at dinner each night or before bed to read a few verses and discuss what God reveals about Himself. Asking the question, "What did we learn about God?" is a beautiful way to engage young minds and help them lean into the Holy Spirit's teaching and guidance. Then, continue the discussion by asking, "How can this change the way we live?" to encourage conversations on God's character and our identity and purpose. Here are a few verses to get you started:

- God is a wonderful Creator. (Psalm 139:13–14; Genesis 1:27; Ephesians 2:10)
- God is our Father. (Romans 8:15; 1 Peter 2:9; 2 Corinthians 2:18).
- God speaks. (Psalm 119:105; Isaiah 30:21; 2 Timothy 3:16-17).
- God forgives. (Psalm 23:5; 1 Peter 2:24; Colossians 3:13)

This summer, set a family goal to sit down weekly and reflect on who God is and His character. This provides space for your family to experience who He is. Then, remember and celebrate all that the Holy Spirit revealed in those sacred family times at the end of the summer. Knowledge and understanding of His Word can help us grow in our relationship with God.

Something New in YOU: A Devotion for Students

Have you ever had a moment in your life where you cared so much about what others thought about you? My junior high and high school years were filled so much anxiety that was rooted in my perception of what others thought about me. I was constantly concerned about my clothes, my hair, what I wore, and what I said. My identity was connected to always looking for opportunities to prove myself and show myself capable. I relished the opportunities in PE classes or other extracurricular activities to display my competency and talent. My mind was constantly racing and considering what was going through the minds of others. I wanted to know what they thought of me. I wanted them to think highly of me. My identity drove my need to perform, the need to always prove myself. Anyone who has ever lived this way knows that this is an extremely exhausting way to live.

If many of us are honest, this is how we often function in our relationship with our heavenly Father. We question our identity, we wrestle with our own thoughts, and we wonder what our heavenly Father thinks of us. We spend our lives trying to prove ourselves to Him. We spend our lives hoping that He will accept us, love us, and delight in us. To make it worse, we often attempt to impose our own anxiety with how we feel towards God onto others in order to make ourselves feel better. This is what we see Martha doing with Mary in Luke chapter 10. Luke writes:

As Jesus and his disciples were on their way, he came to a village where a woman named Martha opened her home to him. She had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said. But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!" "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her" (vv. 38-42).

Martha was convinced that the best thing for herself and Mary to be doing was serving the Savior, but Jesus flips the script. Jesus makes clear that Him taking care of Mary is far better (for Mary) than Mary taking care of Him. That's why Jesus said, "Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her" (Luke 10:42). Jesus was not interested in Martha imposing her anxiety on Mary. Instead, Jesus was far more concerned about what He had to offer Mary than what Mary had to offer Him.

This is what makes the Christian so precious. Instead of wrapping up our identity in the things that we do, Jesus anchors our identity in what He has done for us! When our heavenly Father looks at us, He sees the life, death, and resurrection of His son. This is what the apostle Paul meant when he wrote to the church in Corinth "Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17 ESV). This truth gifts us two things. First, it liberates us from the need to perform for God's love and second, it assures us what our heavenly Father thinks about us. Jesus' finished work means that God's thoughts towards us become one with His thoughts towards Jesus.

STUDENT CHALLENGE

If you resonate with this struggle of constantly wondering or wrestling with what God thinks of you, here is my challenge to you: Sit down with a piece of paper and a pen. Quiet your heart. Write down all the thoughts that you believe God thinks about His perfect son, Jesus. Then read those thoughts out loud and receive them for yourself. Always remember that this is what the cross has purchased for you. Then, thank your heavenly Father for all that He has done for you in Christ!

THE RHYTHM OF FAMILY TRADITIONS

Sometimes just making it to the end of the day is a win. And then someone comes talking about intentionally establishing family traditions and you just want to scream. Who in the world has the time and energy to establish family traditions?! It takes everything you have just to make it to bedtime.

But then you recall something your family used to do. Some silly little game you played, a ritual you observed regularly, or a place you used to visit often. Suddenly, you remember what it is like to be a child in a family, part of something larger than yourself, finding meaning in belonging to the group. You desperately want this for your children; you want them to know they matter, are loved, and they belong. But where to begin? The schedule is already overpacked. How are you going to work in new traditions and rhythms?

Traditions take many shapes; some are performed daily, some yearly. Sometimes they form intentionally, sometimes not. They can last a season or persist through generations. The most important thing to keep in mind is that to be truly meaningful for your family, it needs to fit your family. If your kids hate board games, don't try to establish board game night (no matter how much you enjoyed it as a kid!). Traditions need to be for the whole family if they are to be successful in establishing a family-wide bond. When my wife and I discovered we had conflicting traditions around opening Christmas presents, we had to come up with something that worked for our new family.

When children grow up in a home with traditions, it connects them to something larger than themselves. Childhood traditions can give a person signposts that help her narrate her life story, and that is the basis of Christian identity formation. Our God is a storytelling God, and we are storytellers too. If you want to know someone, you ask for his story. Identity-forming pillars like family traditions often end up becoming permanent fixtures in the story we tell about our lives and the work God has done.

Our family has integrated a **nightly tradition** of blessing into our family life. This happens at the same time every night, and my kids understand that when dad

blesses them, bedtime is next. It didn't take long before my children started saying the blessing with me, even at a very young age. It reinforces that God loves them, their parents love them, and they are safe in their home. It hasn't been easy to implement; in fact, it can be costly. It may mean leaving a social event early or stepping away when company is over, but it is worth it. Here is my blessing; feel free to use it for yourself or come up with your own: "May the Lord bless you and keep you, may He cause His face to shine on you, and may you have a blessed night of sleep and fall more in love with Jesus every day. Amen."

Sunday night is pizza night in our house. This weekly rhythm extends back into my parents' childhoods, and with how much my daughter loves it, I'm convinced it will live on for at least another generation. Every Sunday night, we get pizza. It's that simple. There's no spiritual lesson, just pepperoni and cheese. I discovered my grandparents (on both sides) instituted this tradition because (1) eating out was incredibly rare, so this was a treat, and (2) they each had five kids; pizza was cheap, and everyone liked it. Those are not the reasons my parents or I have kept it up. It doesn't matter anymore; it connects my children to something their dad, grandparents, and great-grandparents used to do. It's a big story, and they are part of it.

Every year when we set up our nativity, we read the story of Jesus' birth from Luke 2. As we come to the different characters in the story, we pause and place the appropriate nativity pieces where they go. This can be done with everyone, including young children, and helps us slow down and reflect on a familiar story.

Are there any traditions you had when you were younger that you could incorporate into your family life? Is there something you all like to do together? Pray about a tradition you could start with your family this month, and then commit to it! Starting a tradition may not be easy, but it will be worth it.
